## **Career Opportunities**

Students prepare for entry-level jobs in fashion design, production & manufacturing. This program also provides partial lower division preparation for the baccalaureate degree in Fashion Design.

#### Job Opportunities:

Salary will depend on ability, experience and skills. Starting salary range from \$8/hour - \$15/hour and occupations include; Assistant Designer, Production Manager, Pattern Drafter, Technical Designer, Quality Control, Samplemaker, and Manufacturers Representative.

This **Certificate of Achievement** will prepare students for an entry-level position in the apparel design and manufacturing industry.

This **Associate Degree** will prepare students for career advancement once a certificate has been earned. Field of concentration selection will also facilitate transfer in a related major
