




What is the difference between credit and noncredit courses?

NONCREDIT	CREDIT
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Courses 600-699 • No enrollment fees • Course material fees may apply • No grades are awarded • Courses do not appear on transcript • Financial aid is not available • Student may repeat courses as often as needed • Noncredit ESL courses can count for certificates 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Courses 001-599, 800-899 • Enrollment fees based on residency status and unit value of course • Grades are awarded for completed course • Courses appear on transcript • Financial aid is available based on eligibility • Limited number of repetitions • Credit ESL courses do not count for certificates





Speaking and Reading ESL Courses


These courses help students improve their English speaking, reading, and writing skills. Students completing these courses will possess the English language skills necessary for most daily activities and for a wide variety of occupations.
